Sarah Breann Royer (she/they), Assistant Director of SYO, performs trumpet and percussion regularly throughout the Indy area, teaches private lessons and sectionals at local schools, techs for marching bands, and composes and arranges music for small groups, bands, and handbell choirs. She also performs regularly with the Cross of Grace Handbell Choirs. Breann has worked with children and adults with developmental disabilities and as a social worker for the past 18 years. Breann earned their bachelor's degree in psychology with a minor in music from Marian University and is currently a clinical mental health counseling graduate student at Marian University and is working towards her PhD. In her free time, Breann enjoys reading books, playing games, spending time with friends and family, and traveling.

Dr. Shawn Royer (she/her), Director and Founder of SYO, is an Assistant Professor and Chair of the Music Department at Marian University where she teaches clarinet, directs the jazz band and concert band, and works with preservice music educators. Dr. Royer earned her PhD in music education with a minor in jazz pedagogy from the Indiana University Jacobs School of Music and she was just selected as a quarter-finalist for the national GRAMMY Music Educator award. She is a Yamaha Performing Artist and Vandoren Artist Clinician who maintains an active career performing jazz. She also directs the 65th Street Klezmorim and the Swing Shift Indy Big

Sweep Dreams ... Danny Raymond (b. 1964)

In the subtitle of this piece, the composer calls it, "a percussion ensemble for cleaning supplies." This piece was composed to be performed on "found percussion," meaning using everyday items in a percussive or otherwise musical way to make music. Toadstool Dance ... Zaneon Meinhart (b. 2001)

This piece, composed specifically for the 2023 SYO season, is meant to evoke the imagery of gnomes dancing in a mystical celebration. The piece features a bassline ostinato that helps center the unusual harmony and sparse melodic content.

Wellerman ... traditional, arr. Kathleen Wissinger

This piece is a traditional sea chanty originating from New Zealand around 1860. In this arrangement, the drum establishes the rhythmic sway of the ocean while the upper bells twinkle like the shiny glimmer of the sun on the ocean waves.

This popular song was first released by Neal Diamond in 1969. The piece is played frequently at sporting events, and is a favorite melody of pep bands everywhere. We hope you will join in with us by singing along with the *"bop bop bah!"*

It's Only a Paper Moon ... Harold Arlen (1905-1986), arr. Jerry Nowak

This jazz standard was first published in 1932 as part of the Broadway musical, "The Great Magoo." The musical did not do well but the song has become part of the great American songbook. The most well-known recordings were sung by Paul Whiteman, Nat King Cole, Ella Fitzgerald, and Frank Sinatra. However, we think you'll prefer our version with Hugo Vasquez and Abby Meinhart on vocals!

Hunnybee ... Ruban Nielson, Cody Nielson, Jake Portrait, arr. Zaneon Meinhart

This song from neo-psychedlic rock band, Unknown Mortal Orchestra, formed in 2011, was written as a platonic love song for front man, Ruban Nielson's, daughter. The surrounding album, the band's fourth, explores themes of modern isolation and technology – subjects that Hunnybee addresses as well. Ruban warns his daughter and the audience, "Don't be such a modern stranger."

Stardust ... Hoagy Carmichael (1899-1981), arr. Alan Glasscock

The great Hoagy Carmichael told a few different versions of the story of this song's creation throughout his lifetime. However, the one that seems to have solidified its place in the historical record is that Carmichael first heard this beautiful melody in his head in 1927 while wondering through the campus of Indiana University in Bloomington on a dark night under the moonlit sky. He ran across the street to the Book Nook, a popular hangout for the college crowds, and picked out the notes on the establishment's piano. When he first recorded the piece with Bix Biederbeck at Gennett Studios in Richmond, Indiana, they performed the piece much faster. Since then, it has become common practice to perform the piece as a slow ballad. Listen for the clarinet leading the saxophone section – as it should be – and lovely solos played by the lead tenor and second trumpet.

This song is straight outta Gogo's brain and sure to stick in yours! Enjoy this funky vehicle for "going crazy" on our instruments!

West Side Story, Selections for Orchestra ... Leonard Bernstein (1918-1990), arr. Jack Mason Ashton Roman, conductor

Bernstein was an American composer who composed the music for the musical, West Side Story. Similar to the love story of Romeo and Juliet, West Side Story is a love story. However, the plot is set in New York City, where members of two gangs, the Jets and the Sharks, have an ongoing rivalry. Two star-crossed lovers and members of opposing gangs, Maria and Riff, tragically fall in love. Listen for all of the many themes from the musical that you will certainly recognize, including "I Feel Pretty," "Maria," "Something's Coming," "Tonight," "One Hand,

One Heart," "Cool," and "America."

An American in Paris Suite ... George Gershwin (1898-1937), arr. by John Whitney Zaneon Meinhart, conductor

Written in 1928, An American in Paris is one of Gershwin's best known compositions. It portrays an American's musical impressions of a trip to Paris. In his words, Gershwin described the piece as "the most modern work I have ever attempted." The first section begins with a light and animated theme which is quickly transformed into a rich, bluesy, brassy orchestration, accentuated with saxophones and a strong rhythmic undercurrent. This blues then rises to a climax and is followed by a return to the vivacity and bubbling exuberance of the opening melody. At the conclusion, the street noises of Parisian life and French atmosphere are triumphant.

Selections from The Phantom of the Opera ... Andrew Lloyd Weber (b. 1948), arr. Calvin Custer Dr. Shawn Royer, conductor

This masterful arrangement features all of your favorite melodies from the hit Broadway musical, The Phantom of the Opera. First premiering in 1986, this musical was the longest running show in Broadway during its run which only ended in April of this year. In this arrangement, see if you can pick out these familiar melodies: "Think of Me," "Angel of Music," "The Music of the Night," "Masquerade," and "All I Ask of You." Hashiveinu is a Hebrew language prayer of repentance and renewal. This arrangement by SYO College Intern, Zaneon Meinhart, gives each instrument a chance to play the somber melody, then the instruments play the melody in a three part canon. This means each part is playing the same melody, but starting at different times. The strings, along with light guitar accompaniment, will draw you into emotive meditation with this beautiful folk melody.

Eleanor Rigby, a timeless Beatles' classic, originally premiered as a classic rock hit in 1966. This arrangement for woodwind ensemble features various instruments weaving the melody throughout the piece.

Excerpt from Mvmt I. Allegretto ... Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart (1756-1791)

Mozart wrote this piece in 1786 for Franz Anton Hoffmeister, from which the piece derives its nickname. This quartet is marked by its use of polyphonic melodies and motifs played almost in canon. Listen for the dramatic contrasts and sharp rhythms that accompany sustained melodies in the first violin and cello.

John Powell is an American composer most widely known for his beautiful score in the hit film series "How to Train Your Dragon." This medley takes you through the adventurous opening as the melody passes through several instruments and leads into the slower section recognized as "Romantic Flight." Lastly, the final harmonies come together during "Test Drive" and end the piece with excitement.
